The module encourages students to think about two related things: what we mean by literature or the literary; and why, for any literary work, a particular form has been chosen in which to address the reader. The module achieves this aim through an historical mapping of developments in the forms of poetry, prose and drama. The texts are chosen from various periods in order to focus the questions above and to promote informed, critical attempts to answer them.

Shakespeare and Performance

This module samples a generic mix of Shakespeare's plays and provides a broad introduction to contemporary Shakespeare study. The specific forms of Shakespearean drama are explored not only in their early modern contexts, including the performance practices of the time, but also in terms of other key approaches and topics in current Shakespeare performance, criticism and theory.

The Novel

The novel has been the dominant literary form in the UK for 200 hundred years. This module traces the origins of the form in the seventeenth century, and charts its changing shapes and concerns through to the late twentieth century. The module charts in particular the sense, from its beginnings, of the novel's strong relation to 'reality'. It aims to set out the central ways that the form has attempted to assert this relation, and the problems and tensions inherent in this, through readings of some of the central novels in English.

The Nineteenth Century

In this module students examine the 'long' nineteenth century in terms of its vibrant and challenging literary and cultural histories. Centring upon ideas of 'revolution', the module examines continuities and developments across the Romantic and Victorian periods through a selection of key primary texts (poetry, novels, drama, non-fictional prose, art works). Issues considered may include the impact of the French Revolution; nature and the imagination; industrialisation and the city; medievalism; faith and doubt; scientific revolution; gender and sexuality; imperialism and the nation.

Writing Revolutions

This module addresses the literary innovations of the 16th and 17th centuries, relating these to the period's central religious, social and political upheavals. The module examines a comprehensive array of literary and theatrical experimentation, emphasising works of the late Elizabethan period through to the English revolution, and is organised in three thematic groups: religion, the social individual, and power and politics. Each presents the revolutionary and renovating concerns inspiring new formal experimentation in verse, prose and drama. The module deepens understanding of a crucial period in literary innovation, further developing students' skills in relating formal considerations to larger historical and political forces.

Making Memory: Culture History and

Representation

Module Code: 5ELIT007W Level 5 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module introduces students to the key debates and conceptions that have been central to the formation of current understandings of memory, and its relationship to culture, history and representation. Topics considered will include slavery; the Holocaust; autobiography and testimony; and the impact of 9/11.

Modernism

Module Code: 6ELIT002W Level 6 Year

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 40 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 8 /

ECTS credits 20*

The category of modernism is central to the discipline of English studies, and this module is designed to build on and deepen student understanding developed at levels 4 and 5. The module studies selected literary writing, visual art and film from the early twentieth century and examines them in terms of the central place of form. Modernist remaking of form fundamentally rethinks the relation between all forms of representation and the world, and modernism will be examined in terms of its being both a reaction to and a constituent part of modernity. Students will be introduced to the political and social contexts that help to define this period of rapid and drastic change and then consider the aesthetic and ideological strategies adopted by modernist practice.

In terms of form, the module provides a foundation in the cross-linguistic structure of words (morphology) and sentences (syntax), whilst considering different types of languages around the world (typology). With respect to language as behaviour, the module introduces the study of language in society (sociolinguistics) and the way in which language is used in conversational situations (pragmatics).

Language Structure and Meaning

Phonetics and Phonology concentrate on articulatory phonetics and phonological systems, Syntax on the description of language structure, Semantics on the meaning of words and sentences, and Pragmatics examines how more meaning is conveyed in conversation than literally said. The description and explanation of aspects of language will be informed by current theoretical ideas within each area.

Family Law and Family Justice

It will explore the ways in which the state and the law intervene in and regulate private and family life, and whether such intervention and regulation is justifiable. The module will also identify the substantive law in key areas, consider its origins and development, and consider its application to solve factual problems. After a core component of family law study it will allow students to make an in-module choice about an area of family law and/or family justice which they wish to explore in greater depth. These areas will involve a range of private and public law topics, the opportunity to undertake comparative law research, and the option to participate in the University Student Law Clinic advising clients with family law issues (where space allows)

Commercial Law

This module provides an opportunity to consider the role of the law in relation to commercial transactions and the ways in which the law intervenes and regulates commerce, trade and business. It will examine the purposes of commercial law and the way it facilitates the commercial practices of the business community. The law will also identify the substantive law in key areas, consider its development and application to contracts for the sale of goods, insurance of goods and methods of payment, security and finance of contracts of sale.

Disability Law

Module Code: 6LLAW003W Level 6 Year

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 40 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 8 /

ECTS credits 20*

This module will identify the ideas, principles and concepts that underpin the theoretical framework of disability law, and stress competing perspectives. Students will critically evaluate the legal and non-legal issues that form the core of disability law and appreciate the contextual dimension to the subject. Students will apply a wide range of developed research skills, and demonstrate effective writing skills with minimal supervision.

Company Law

Module Code: 6LLAW004W Level 6 Year

ECTS credits 20*

The module explores the concept of legal personality as applied to companies registered under the Companies Act 2006. The rules relating to companies are analysed from legal, practical, historical, economic, sociological and political perspectives. Distinguishing between companies and partnerships. Types of companies, harmonisation and

European Union directives. Corporate legal personality, the constitution of the company. Promotions, introduction to corporate finance, directors and other company officers, directors' powers, duties and liabilities. Shareholders, the conduct of company meetings. Insider dealings, introduction to company insolvency, liquidation. The operations of stock markets, corporate governance and Corporate Social Responsibility. The module also introduces students to company accounts and financial statements, as well as key aspects of corporate taxation.

Employment Law

This module is concerned with the regulation of Industrial Relations and the rights of the employee in the workplace. It includes some limited historical analysis of the position of different Governments and the theoretical approaches to the subject. There is specific analysis of the major collective and individual rights including unfair dismissal, redundancy, sex discrimination, sexual orientation discrimination, race discrimination, religion and belief discrimination, disability discrimination, age discrimination, equal pay, support for collective bargaining, the rights of trade union members and the lawfulness of industrial action. The creation and enforcement of contractual rights is also a central tenet.

International Law and Global Justice

Module Code: 6LLAW006W Level 6 Year

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 40 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 8 /

ECTS credits 20*

The module explores sources, theories and principles of public international law, and the role of international law in regulating relationships between states, and between states and other actors in the international legal system. The module incorporates traditional and critical perspectives on international law, examining the subject in its historical and contemporary political context. Throughout the module, over-arching themes are explored, including legitimacy, the relation between international and domestic law, and contemporary challenges to the traditional framework of international law. The first part of the module considers foundational aspects and principles of international law. In the second part of the module students may opt to focus on particular substantive areas and issues in international law. Options may include: peace, security and conflict; third world approaches to international law, and human rights.

Assessment: Essay (40%), Coursework (10%), Project (45%), Coursework (5%)

Entertainment Law: Theory and Practice

Module Code: 6LLAW007W Level 6 Year

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 40 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 8 /

ECTS credits 20*

This module is concerned with both theoretical and practical elements of the entertainment business. It will identify the ideas, principles and concepts that underpin the theoretical framework of the specialist area of Entertainment law and explore competing perspectives Entertainment is given a broad definition and includes sport, music and other leisure and recreational activities. Students will deal with a variety of issues including contracts, copyright and

licensing. There are elements of civil, criminal and, increasingly, European law. Students will be expected, with support, to develop their own piece of individual research in an area agreed with the course tutor.

Law of International Trade

This module is designed to familiarise students with the rights and obligations of the exporter and importer in an international sales transaction. It will enable students to recognise the complexities of international trade and identify the essential elements of such transactions. It will stress competing perspectives and explore the principles and concepts that underpin the theoretical framework of international trade. It will assist students to appreciate and analyse the many contracts (i.e. contract of sale, contract of insurance, contract of carriage and documentary credit) involved in international commerce and the contextual dimension of the subject. Students will apply a wide range of developed research skills and demonstrate writing skills with minimal supervision.

Assessment: Examination - open book (45%), Project (50%), Coursework (5%)

Media Law

Module Code: 6LLAW009W Level 6 Year

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 40 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 8 /

ECTS credits 20*

This course will consider the relevance of the media in today's society and the impact of regulation on the media within its political context. The course consists of two main elements: the structure of the media, including regulation relating to ownership and competition law, and the impact of technological convergence on that regulation; and the regulation of the content of the material that may be disseminated, including specific areas of contemporary concern such as contempt of court, privacy case law and taste and decency.

Assessment: Coursework (20%), Project (30%), Examination - open book (45%), Coursework (5%) *All transcripts are issued in UK credits.

Environmental Law

Module Code: 6LLAW010W Level 6 Year

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 40 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 8 /

ECTS credits 20*

Environmental Law offers a new, radical way of approaching the issues of environmental degradation, the challenges of environmental protection and the future of the global environment. Radically interdisciplinary, Environmental Law is an experimental module that addresses the connections between the human, the natural and the legal from a theoretical as well as applied perspective. The module addresses key environmental issues and their interaction with ethical, sociological and broader philosophical issues. The themes that the module explores are: ecology and ecological consciousness; risk and future prevention of environmental damage; the challenges of the global environment; non-Western perspectives: the South, the East, the global margins; indigenous populations; environmental Rights/Animal Rights/Human Rights. This is a discussion-only module with no lectures and aims at subverting preconceived ideas about what the law, the environment and humanity is. The students will be encouraged to read texts on the above themes, but also undertake action as part of their Ecological Action Project,

on issues such as recycling, social ecological action, access to environmental information, and so on, by using the law actively and in relation to real firms/organisations/councils.

The emphasis is on critically examining law and the interdisciplinary context within which it operates. The module will examine specific perspectives, methodologies and themes within current legal research, with an emphasis on adventurous theoretical enquiry. The module identifies themes and flows within different legal disciplines and invites enquiry through research, immersive workshops, paper presentations and seminars, delivered by both the module leaders and guest speakers or other Westminster staff who have an interest in the areas we explore. Students will be able to identify themes which emerge from areas of law which they have studied or have an interest in, and how these themes coincide to produce inventive critical enquiry. Examples of this would be the space/territory themes in environmental law and international law, bodies/sexuality themes in crime, human rights and religion. Students would be encouraged to explore perspectives such as feminism, ecology, post-structuralism, new materialisms, autopoiesis, geography, anthropology, phenomenology, art practices, musical expression, performance, deconstruction, Deleuzian studies, and so on.

The module provides students with an introduction to the relevant theories of interpersonal and global communication. By exploring these theories and linking them to practical everyday situations, students will have the opportunity to reflect on how these apply to their own communicative contexts. Focus will be placed on gaining practical strategies for enhancing their own competences as communicators.

Language, Power and Institutions: Decoding

Dominant Narratives

Module Code: 5LANS001W Level 5 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

Pre-requisite: Arabic, Chinese, French or Spanish.

Students will be required to attend a testing session upon arrival to confirm eligibility.

In this module you will examine how those in positions of power use language to create narratives, values and beliefs held by different groups of people in the world. The module focuses on the role and purpose of different kinds of organisations and analyses the means through which they maintain their identity in the international public sphere and the language they use to do so. You will be shown methods of reading between the lines and how to evaluate the success or otherwise of their communications.

Professionalising Global Communication

In this module students will expand their knowledge of and expertise in functioning as communicators in an

international environment. Students will analyse the use of language and culture in professional contexts from a range of perspectives including translational communication and working in a multilingual, multicultural environment. Students will apply current theories of discourse, interpersonal and intercultural communication to real world contexts and improve their own practical competencies as international communicators.

<u>Dreaming the Same Dream? Concepts of</u> Happiness Across Cultures

Module Code: 6LANS005W Level 6 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

Pre-requisite: Arabic, Chinese, French or Spanish.

Students will be required to attend a testing session upon arrival to confirm eligibility.

This module is built on a critical approach to the newly founded discipline of happiness studies. It will introduce key texts in this discipline, and will also give an overview of the main philosophical underpinnings and conceptual approaches to happiness in philosophical traditions. It will then proceed to analyse different conceptualizations and representations of happiness in different contemporary cultural contexts, ranging from the psychological, sociological and political to the literary and artistic, including the ephemeral and comical. Through the study of concepts and examples from different cultures, students will gain a critical perspective on the recently emerged dominant discourse on happiness.

People and Things on the Move: Identity, Place and Memory in and Across Diasporic Spaces

Module Code: 6LANS006W Level 6 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module explores the issue of mobilities with a conceptual focus on the mutually constitutive relationship

between the movement of people and things and in interdisciplinary and comparative perspectives. Drawing on contemporary literature on migration and diaspora studies, theories of culture studies, transnationalism, postcolonialism and globalisation, it introduces students to theoretical debates in three interrelated areas: identities and belongings; homecoming and place-making; memory and heritage. The module encourages students to engage critically with these issues through specific language-based and contextualized cases studies of migrants in relation to consumption and production of everyday materialities. It will also invite students to think reflexively and transculturally about their own identities and home in the world of mobilities.

Politics and International Relations

<u>Dilemmas of International Development</u>

Module Code: 4PIRS003W Level 4 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module provides an in-depth introduction to the multi-disciplinary field of development studies. It introduces students to key debates in development theory and to the history of development policy and practice. The course encourages students to think critically about what development is, about how it is carried out and what it can achieve. We will explore the 'grand' development theories and approaches such as modernisation, dependency, neo-liberalism and alternatives. The module gives students the opportunity to consider the role of these approaches in assisting or hindering progress in a globalised world, whether in terms of distribution of wealth, political change or human rights; and further to assess the relevance of various development policies to the everyday lives of people living in the global south.

Political Ideas in Action

Module Code: 4PIRS006W Level 4 Year

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 40 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 8 /

ECTS credits 20*

The module explores three linked components of political power: ideas, structures and agency. In liberal democracies, political ideas and ideology motivate and drive political 'actors' (including individuals, parties and movements) to compete over political power within the framework of constitutions, institutions and conventions that define the 'rules of the game'. The module examines the liberal democratic foundations of the UK political system and the competing ideologies that operate within it; ways in which political power is allocated, won and lost; and illustrates the power game through a study political leadership.

Asia, Africa and Latin America: Dynamism and Change in the Global South

Module Code: 5PIRS001W Level 5 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module is an introductory examination of the politics and international relations in regions and countries in Asia, Africa and Latin America, as sites that are predominantly associated with crisis and problems, but also with liberation and resistance, rising power and growth. It investigates the political development of the 'global south' as a bloc of international solidarity and also as a collection of states and political systems whose trajectories into the 21st century and engagement in the global order are highly differentiated. They range from emerging global powers to 'failed states', from most rapidly growing countries to the poorest ones, from experiencing the most violent conflicts to having long term stability. Students will critically evaluate the narratives, concepts, theories and experiences of political development in the global south, working individually and collaboratively to develop their empirical and theoretical knowledge of these dynamic regions.

Geopolitics

Module Code: 5PIRS005W Level 5 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module will introduce the study of geopolitics and translate its significance for understanding the contemporary

international order. It considers the territorial, spatial and social dimensions of international politics through a detailed investigation of historical, critical and geographical perspectives that emerge through competing accounts of geopolitics. It surveys the history of geopolitics within the 20th century and seeks to understand the underlying geopolitical factors emergent in the post-Cold War era. The focus is on developing a critical architecture to understand the spatial and social underpinnings of world politics, exploring the potential of critical geopolitics to rethink dominant 'logics' of world politics. The module draws upon a series of case studies that demonstrate the spatialised vocabulary of war, state violence and the interstate relations within global politics.

Global Political Economy

Module Code: 5PIRS006W Level 5 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

Global Political Economy (GPE) is the study of political and economic interaction, involving a multiplicity of actors, across borders in world affairs. It looks at global political economy through a set of concepts and issues. The module offers a critical overview of major perspectives in political economy and employs them to evaluate certain policies and institutions, nationally and internationally.

Assessment: Presentation Group (25%), Coursework (25%), Essay (50%)

Theorising Politics and International Relations

Module Code: 5PIRS017W Level 5 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

Through the study of a selection of classical texts and exploration of contemporary approaches to the study of politics and international relations, this module offers students the chance to enrich their disciplinary knowledge and understanding. By exploring the points of contact and departure between political thought and theories of international relations students gain an understanding of the diversity of theory and its role as a key source of innovation.

Assessment: Portfolio (10%), Essay (45%), Essay (45%)

American Power in a Multi-Polar World

Module Code: 6PIRS002W Level 6 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module seeks to explain the formulation and implementation of US foreign policy. The module examines and applies a range of relevant traditional as well as critical approaches, such as institutionalism, realism, strategic-relational approach and discourse analysis, to the analysis of US foreign policy and policy-making in order to throw light on the role of the United States in international affairs.

Assessment: Presentation Group (25%), Project (75%)

Contested Sovereignty: Jurisdiction and Power in Contemporary International Relations

The nature of sovereignty has changed dramatically in the post-Cold War era and continues to evolve. The rights and responsibilities of states have been challenged by issues such as pre-emptive self-defence, international terrorism and the promotion of human rights; this has been reflected in a number of new controversies related to the laws governing intervention and the remit of international law. This module explores the forces which have influenced the evolution of sovereignty in the contemporary era, analyses their catalysts and identifies the key debates which have shaped the contestation surrounding sovereignty in the contemporary era.

Assessment: Coursework (30%), Essay (70%)

Gender and Politics

Module Code: 6PIRS009W Level 6 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

In this module students examine political, societal, cultural and economic beliefs and practices at both the domestic and international levels through the lenses of gender, sexuality, and intersectionality, and through feminist critique. The module brings into sharp focus the problems of discrimination, marginalisation and exclusion based on gender and sexuality. Knowledge of gender relations is used to deepen student understanding of wider political, cultural, economic and social processes, practices, and power relations at national and international levels.

Assessment: Coursework (20%), Presentation (20%), Essay (60%)

Postcolonial Politics and International Relations

The module will offer students an advanced engagement with postcolonial perspectives to the study of politics at local, national, regional, international and global levels. How have various thinkers from different parts of the world sought to question the eurocentrism of the dominant theories and concepts in Politics and in International Relations? What are the various ways in which we can understand the pluralist, asymmetrical and inconsistent experiences of different cultures, societies, and polities in contemporary post-colonial times? Does postcolonial theory offer different ways of looking at the core concepts of politics – say, nationalism and democracy - relevant for the majority world? What does postcolonial politics actually imply? Key concepts and issues of politics and IR will be examined from different critical perspectives while highlighting the structuring role of ideas and practices of imperialism, colonialism, orientalism and resistance.

Security and the Surveillance State

Module Code: 6PIRS016W Level 6 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

Security and surveillance represent an increasingly important aspect of western governance, to the extent that western democracies are now sometimes characterised as 'surveillance states'. Through the lens of 'internal' security, this module addresses the changing relationship between state and society in contemporary politics. It applies new concepts of security, state and society to contemporary case studies of key themes. These will vary from year to year according to contemporary relevance and the availability of resources. Examples may include: counter-terrorism and approaches to radicalisation; cyber-security and the Snowden affair; the policing of border control; social and individual perceptions of risk, etc. Drawing on varied literatures including internal security, civil society and behavioural psychology and sociology, the module offers an opportunity for students to reflect on the

nature of legitimacy, control and freedoms under conditions of globalisation and electronic communication.

Social and Political Movements in a Globalising World

Module Code: 6PIRS017W Level 6 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

Social and political movements – the main, even only, way that many people 'do' politics – are established features of contemporary societies. They bring new ideas into public discourse and challenge the practices of governments and states. The module analyses a representative sample of contemporary movements, in the developed world and in other regions; studies the wide range of factors, national and transnational, shaping movement birth, development and decline; and evaluates the main theories used in social movement scholarship.

Oil, Globalisation and Development in the Middle East and Central Asia

Module Code: 6PIRS019W Level 6 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module concentrates on the politics of development, mainly, in the Middle East and partially Central Asia, investigating the extent to which these regions have been structured by international and global political economy as opposed to domestic factors. The module examines major debates and issues in state formation, political regimes, economy and society, particularly considering the legacies of imperialism and the impacts of neo-liberalism on the regional dynamics of development. It investigates the politics of key national resources such as oil and food and their implications for state, politics, economy and society. We look at the main political forms and forces, including the authoritarian 'rentier' state, pressures for democratisation and liberalisation, and the rise of political Islam. The final part of the module focuses on conflict, intervention, and popular struggle, reflecting on perspectives on future development in the region.

Sociology

Thinking Sociologically

Module Code: 4SOCL001W Level 4 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module is an introduction to how classical sociological theory has explained social structures and divisions in society. The work of Marx, Durkheim and Weber is introduced to explain the transition from traditional to modern society. Drawing on key features of contemporary society the module also questions and critiques the classical theorists' applicability to 21st century global society.

Assessment: Essay (50%), Examination - closed book (50%)

Introducing Media and Cultural Studies

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module provides an introduction to the study of media and culture, and demonstrates how important they are to an understanding of contemporary society. The module introduces key concepts and applies these to the analysis of a variety of cultural texts, from films and TV to magazines and social media. We apply the insights that can be derived from a range of different critical approaches, and place an emphasis on developing the practice of critical interpretation.

Modern Social Theory

Module Code: 5SOCL001W Level 5 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4/

ECTS credits 10*

This module explores the development of social theorising in the 20th Century. It considers the continuities and discontinuities in social theorising in the context of rapid social change and it is concerned with the exploring how the core concepts of classical theory have been adapted, reworked or discarded in response to changing times. Theorists including Lukacs, Parsons, Goffman, the Frankfurt School and the symbolic interactionists will be studied.

Assessment: Essay (50%), Examination - Seen (50%)

Sexualities

Module Code: 5SOCL005W Level 5 Semester 1

Location: Regent UK Credit Value: 20 Equivalent Credit Value: US Credits 4 /

ECTS credits 10*

This module explores sexuality as a central component of contemporary life and asks how it is deployed in constructions of identity, politics, morality, oppression, liberation, and civilization itself. Sociological, feminist and queer approaches to sexuality, including critiques of essentialism and heteronormativity, are discussed along with topics including danger, the nation, marriage and pornography.

Assessment: Essay (50%), Coursework (50%)

Globalisation and the Media

The strong link between globalisation and the media has brought about some of the most fundamental social, political and economic changes across the globe. This module assesses how globalisation facilitates the instant exchange of information and the news and asks questions about the expanded reach of multinational corporations through greater information connectivity, global advertising strategies, and integration of economic activity across borders.

It introduces poststructuralist perspectives, and engages with an eclectic range of sociological theories and debates that provide new and exciting ways of thinking about life in the twenty-first century. Students are shown how theories can be used to explore, explain and understand contemporary social issues, problems or concerns.

Making Bodies: Gender, Culture, Science

As human beings our experience of the world is fundamentally embodied – lived in, through and as bodies. This module explores how those bodies are 'made' culturally, and how some become more socially powerful than others. In particular it problematizes dominant scientific/medical discourses, and examines the centrality of gender, race, class and sexuality in debates about the body and identity. Sociological, feminist and queer theories of embodiment are discussed via a range of topics such as medicalization, reproduction, body modification, health, drag, transgender, disability and obesity

Perils and Pleasures: A London Sociology of

Leisure

ECTS credits 10*

London has a long and rich history as a site for transgression, entertainment and leisure. This module, using London as a point of departure, critically examines sociological theories of leisure, emotion, embodiment and pleasure. Drawing on scholarship from urban sociology, leisure studies and cultural studies, we will critically examine and evaluate practices from clubbing to shopping.
