Student Code of Conduct

1. Introduction

- 1.1 The University is a scholarly, (and essentially adult), community for the pursuit of learning and research. The purpose of the University is to provide teaching, encourage learning and promote research. It also aims to support the recreational and social needs of its students in connection with their scholarly pursuits. It is a community which embraces diversity and inclusion. As members of this scholarly community, all students are required at all times, on and off campus, to conduct themselves in a manner that is considerate, courteous and respectful of others and of the pursuits of the University and to act responsibly in all their behaviour.
- 1.2 The Diversity and Dignity at Work and Study Policy ('the Policy') supports the University's commitment to diversity, inclusion and equality of opportunity and protects the well-being of all members of the University. The Policy sets out the University's position on sexual misconduct, bullying, harassment, unlawful discrimination and victimisation, (and where those terms are used in this Code of Conduct the definitions in Appendix 1(a) of the Policy will apply, as follows:
- **Sexual misconduct:**
Sexual misconduct means unwanted or attempted unwanted conduct of a sexual nature, which includes but is not limited to: Sexual harassment; Sexual assault; and Rape. For the purposes of applying this definition, a person will be deemed to have consented to conduct of a sexual nature if they have agreed by choice and have the freedom and capacity to make that choice.
 - **Bullying:**
Offensive, intimidating, malicious, hostile or insulting behaviour, including behaviour involving the misuse of power (whether or not a person is in a position of authority in relation to another), that has the purpose or effect of making a person feel vulnerable, upset, humiliated, undermined, intimidated, degraded or threatened. Bullying may be physical, verbal or non-verbal conduct.
 - **Harassment means any of the following:**
1) Harassment (under the Equality Act 2010)
 - Unwanted conduct related to a relevant protected characteristic* which has the purpose or effect of violating another person's dignity or creating an intimidating, hostile, degrading, humiliating or offensive environment for that person.
 - Unwanted conduct of a sexual nature which has the purpose or effect of violating another person's dignity, or creating an intimidating, hostile, degrading, humiliating or offensive environment for that person (referred to in this Policy as 'sexual harassment').
 - Unwanted conduct (by person A) of a sexual nature or conduct that is related to gender reassignment or sex which has the purpose or effect of violating another person's (person B's) dignity, or creating an intimidating, hostile, degrading, humiliating or offensive environment for B and, because of B's rejection of or submission to the conduct, A treats B less favourably than they would have been had B not rejected or submitted to the conduct.

*The relevant protected characteristics are:

- age;
- disability;
- gender reassignment;
- race;
- religion or belief;
- sex;

- sexual orientation

2) Harassment (under the Protection From Harassment Act 1997) Harassment arises where a person pursues a course of conduct* which they know or ought to know amounts to harassment of another and which:

- harasses one other person on at least two occasions;
- or harasses two or more persons on at least one occasion in relation to each person.

*Reference to a course of conduct includes speech and references to harassment of a person include alarming the person or causing the person distress. The full text of Sections 1 and 7 of the Protection from Harassment Act 1997 is provided at Appendix 1b. When applying the above definitions of harassment, the University will do so in a manner which is consistent with the freedom of speech principles as set out in the University's Code of Practice on Freedom of Speech. It will have particular regard to, and place significant weight on, the importance of freedom of speech within the law, academic freedom and tolerance for controversial views. There will also be a rebuttable presumption to the effect that students being exposed to any of the following is unlikely to amount to harassment for the purposes of this definition: a) the content of higher education course materials, including but not limited to books, videos, sound recordings, and pictures; b) statements made and views expressed by a person as part of teaching, research or discussions about any subject matter which is connected with the content of a higher education course.

- Unlawful discrimination:
Means less favourable treatment by the University under the Equality Act 2010 because of a protected characteristic (direct discrimination) and/or putting a rule or a policy or a way of doing things in place which has a greater negative impact on someone with a protected characteristic than someone without one (indirect discrimination).

For the purposes of unlawful discrimination under the Equality Act, the protected characteristics are as follows:

- for colleagues: age; disability; gender reassignment; marriage and civil partnership; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex; and sexual orientation; and
 - for applicants and students: age; disability; gender reassignment; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex; and sexual orientation.
- Victimisation:
Means subjecting someone to a detriment or otherwise treating them less favourably because they have made (or may make) an allegation or complaint or have otherwise raised (or may raise) a concern about the conduct of a colleague or student or other individual – for example, making a complaint of bullying or harassment or a report of sexual misconduct.

- 1.3 The Policy provides a framework for students and colleagues to understand the routes by which disclosures, reports and complaints about such matters may be raised and resolution sought.
- 1.4 As members of the University, students have a responsibility to help maintain good order and a safe environment which is conducive to study, living and working and the enjoyment by students of a positive student experience. By enrolling on to a course at the University of Westminster students are obliged to comply under the Student Terms and Conditions.
- 1.5 The core purpose of the University is a scholarly community that pursues learning and research. As such, it is extremely important that the learning environment allows students to learn to their fullest potential.
- 1.6 Students who do not meet these requirements may expect to be asked to leave the relevant teaching, learning or research opportunity and may also be subject to disciplinary action.

- 1.7 The Student Disciplinary Regulations may be invoked if a student is suspected of having breached the Code of Conduct. This section sets out examples of behaviour that the University will regard as unacceptable and as such in breach of the Code of Conduct. The list is not exhaustive, and the University is not precluded from treating other instances of behaviour as suspected misconduct.
- 1.8 The University will regard as unacceptable any behaviour by students which improperly interferes with or adversely affects:
- the University's community, pursuits, interests, activities, property or reputation; and/or
 - the safety, well-being, learning, studying, research, student experience, work or activities or interests of its students or staff as members of the University or of its visitors
- 1.9 Misconduct includes, but is not limited to, behaviour which takes place during university related activities (such as teaching, placements, field-trips and extra-curricular activities and events). It includes behaviour which takes place on or off University premises, including digital platforms. It includes behaviour which take place during or outside of term time, and behaviour that affects the reputation of the University in the local community or more widely.
- 1.10 Section 2 of this Code of Conduct sets out the types of behaviour that the University considers to be unacceptable and to constitute misconduct.
- 1.11 This Code of Conduct applies to all students on taught courses, apprenticeships, research degrees and short courses, and to students' visitors.
- 1.12 The University will take seriously any suspected breach of the Code of Conduct and will deal with such breaches through the Student Disciplinary Regulations (or other procedure, as relevant, such as the (Fitness to Practise Policy and Procedure, Fitness to Study/Support to Study Procedure) in the interests of protecting the University, its members, its student experience and its reputation. Penalties for unacceptable behaviour will be commensurate with the seriousness of the offence.
- 1.13 In implementing its Student Disciplinary Regulations to deal with suspected breaches of the Code of Conduct, the University is not investigating suspected breaches of the criminal law or determining whether a crime has taken place and any judgements reached as part of an investigation do not constitute a legal ruling on whether or not criminal activity has taken place. Conduct that could amount to criminal behaviour (whether or not there is a criminal conviction) may also result in a breach of the University's Student Disciplinary Regulations.
- 1.14 The University will provide access to support for affected students as set out in Section 2 of the Student Disciplinary Regulations.
- 1.15 The Student Disciplinary Regulations set out the potential penalties the University may apply in response to a determination that a student has breached the Code of Conduct.
- 1.16 All parties involved in disciplinary processes under the Student Disciplinary Regulations (Students, their representatives, Friends, staff and Witnesses¹) are required to act with courtesy, reasonably and fairly towards each other at all times and to treat the processes with respect and to respect their confidential nature. Students who fail to do so may be subject to further disciplinary action.
- 1.17 The particular requirements of various aspects of the higher educational experience make specific codes of conduct necessary for different parts of the University. The areas that have specific codes are as follows:
- Libraries and IT Labs

- Halls of Residence
 - Acceptable use Policy - IT
 - Freedom of Speech Code of Practice
 - Safety, Health and Wellbeing
- 1.18 Local procedures are also in place in some specialist learning environments (e.g. Biosciences laboratories). In these cases, students on relevant courses will be notified separately of any specific requirements to which they must adhere.

2. Requirements

- 2.1 The University strives to ensure fairness and consistency across the University in the application of penalties imposed for misconduct. The tables below are the indicative behaviours which shall be treated as a breach of the Student Code of Conduct which may result in disciplinary action being taken. They are organised into following sections:

A Offences against People
 B Offences relating to Safety Health and Wellbeing
 C Offences against the Environment
 D Other Offences

- 2.2 Opposite each offence is an example of the type of penalty that may be imposed on a student found to have breached the Code of Conduct. The University will consider all mitigating and aggravating factors when determining the appropriate penalty or penalties to be imposed in each case. Such factors include, but are not limited to, precedent in other similar cases, instances of previous misconduct by the same student, and mitigating circumstances. A full list of the penalties which may be imposed by the University is set out in the Student Disciplinary Regulations.
- 2.3 The principle behind the table is simple and serves to ensure that all Students are aware of the possible penalties that they may receive if they are found to have breached the Code of Conduct under the Student Disciplinary Regulations. This table sets out the possible penalties imposed for minor and major offences. The table is not an exhaustive list of penalties, conditions or offences. The full list of penalties available can be found in the Student Disciplinary regulations.

A15. Initiation Ceremonies of any kind are forbidden at the University of Westminster. In this context an initiation ceremony is defined as a ceremony during which others are made to take part in demeaning activities to gain formal access to student groups i.e. sports clubs and societies, or for the awarding of an emblem or other status associated with that student group, e.g. a tie, trophy or club / society / group office.
