# Westminster Films Win Royal Television Society Awards



In February, two final year documentaries were nominated for 'Best Factual Programme' at 2018 Royal Television Society London Region Awards. Both Westminster production teams were able to celebrate at the ceremony at The London Studios, as both films were honoured with awards.

'Exist. Live. Rejoice.', produced by Yiming Yuan and directed by Deividas Aukscunias, is set in a Lithuanian hospice for the terminally ill, observing the dying residents and the staff caring

for the patients, and won Best Factual. The chair of the judging panel, Factual Television veteran Peter Evans, presented the award saying: "The filmmakers had remarkable access and had clearly gained the trust of the participants, but the way you repay that trust is to do whatever

it takes to tell their story. '1st Old Boys', directed by Dylan Cargill and edited by Tom Hamblin, follows a Belfast brass band as they prepare for a competition. The documentary missed out on Best Factual, but instead won the Best Editing Craft Award. The jury said this film felt like "proper telly... there was a classic narrative arc with a satisfying conclusion." They went on to say that because it was so well shot, edited and recorded, "It could be transmitted just as it is".

# Festival Success for 'Animal' and 'Coffee'

2017 graduation film 'Animal' was selected for the prestigious Camerimage cinematography festival in Poland, in the Student Etudes competition. The cinematographer, Pedro Takahashi, also wrote the script of this film about a girl's split-second decision when pushed to breaking point in a forest. 'Animal' also screened at the Underwire Film Festival, where Polly Rosier received a nomination for Best Producer, and has recently been selected in the Fiction Category at the FiaFest 2018 festival in Columbia. 'Kiss the Devil', a psychological horror film about tumultuous relationship that's seemingly haunted by a novel one of the protagonists is writing, was also screened at

the Underwire festival as part of the Walking Home



Alone at Night programme, and the film's Director of Photography Rachel Wood was nominated for Best Cinematography.

2nd Year drama 'Coffee', which was first screened at Westminster's Graduation Showcase in June 2017, has also enjoyed festival success. After securing a nomination for 'Best Comedy' at the Independent Directions Film Festival 2017, the film was nominated for two awards at the UK Offline Web Fest: Best Actress (Georgia Macquire) and Best Actor (Donal Cox), and won the award for Best Student Film. Coffee was also nominated for Best Short Film at the Exposure Short Film Festival 2018 in Glasgow. The producer and director team of Georgina Rowlands and Ben Porro, have collaborated again on the 2018 graduation film 'Just Josie'.



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# BAFTA Winning Alumni Shoot New Feature in New Orleans



2005 graduate Babak Anvari won a BAFTA last year for his debut feature, 'Under the Shadow', which was also Mark Kermode's 'film of the year' for 2017. His second feature, shot in New Orleans and starring Armie Hammer and Dakota Johnson, is currently in post production. It's still untitled, but is based on a novella by Nathan Ballingrud.

Recently he took a little time out of his busy schedule to answer our questions:

### What drew you to the source novella, and how you feel about working in the horror genre again?

"One of the producers of the film thought I would find it interesting. He wasn't wrong. Even though I wasn't really looking to do another film in the genre space, I was so hooked by the novella that I realised I had to do it - I could clearly see the film version in my head."


### How different was this from shooting 'Under The Shadow'?

"We pitched it to Annapurna Pictures and they came in to fully finance. Working with known Hollywood actors was great, but I did more or less the same prep as with the actors on my first film. All the cast members were incredibly supportive especially Armie Hammer who plays the lead. Shooting in New Orleans was great too. I love that city, with its mysteries and

jazz. We managed to create a family feel even though it was a much larger crew than my first film. Working in the US was also a huge learning curve for me."

### Could you tell us about your choice of DoP?

"Once again it was so good to have Kit Fraser by my side as my DoP. He is not only a great cinematographer but he is also a very close friend of 16 years - I met him on the first year of our course at Westminster and we've been friends and collaborators since then. As you can imagine we now have such a shorthand which allows us to work so fast and efficiently, which ultimately helps the production."

# Two Awards for Westminster at 'Learning on Screen'

The Annual Learning on Screen Awards reward the year's best TV programmes with an educational impact. There are also awards for the best student films of the year.

Two Westminster films were nominated for the 2018 awards, held at the BFI Southbank in London. In 'Self Made Man', filmmaker Harry Taylor's investigation into the world of gender transitions leads to him having to confront issues around his own transition. The film, directed by Yasmin Afifi and produced by Harry Taylor, won the award for Best Student Documentary. 'Animal', a short drama exploring the animalistic nature concealed in all of us, directed by Alex Cole and produced by Polly Rosier, won the Best Undergraduate Fiction award. The judges commended the way the cinematography and sound design of 'Animal captured the atmosphere of an eerie forest, and the authenticity and importance of 'Self Made Man'.

# Graduates Screen at the Historic Regent Street Cinema



This summer, graduates from the Film BA course had their end of year showcase at the University's Regent Street Cinema. The cinema was established in 1848 when it was part of the then Polytechnic Institution. The cinema became the birthplace of cinema in the UK on 20 February 1896, when the Lumière brothers' Cinématographe machine was demonstrated to the press and these earliest of moving images given their first presentation to a paying audience the following day. After a three year fundraising campaign, the cinema was restored and reopened in May 2015 by the University of Westminster and now provides a valuable asset to the course and students.

The graduates produced four graduation dramas and celebrated with a reception at the neighbouring Regent Street Campus of the University. This was attended by students, staff, alumni and industry guests. There was a plethora of films, from 'The Tower' a horror set in London, to 'Just Josie', a comedy set in rural Somerset. 'Terra Firma', one of the four graduation films, is a drama surrounding an astronauts return from a space mission whereas 'Recharge', the final of the four films, explores dystopian themes set in a future where toxic fumes from cars have polluted the UK, and follows a fatherdaughter relationship struggling in such a bleak reality.

The films are now completing the festival circuit, entering into festivals around the world for shorts and student films.
