Central Asia is on the rise as a strategic region in the global economy and renewing its historic role along the Silk Road. Despite a global polycrisis marked by worsening issues of climate change, trade, food, water and energy security, the **new Central Asia** is becoming a space of new opportunities for peace and connectivity, for sustainable development and for pragmatic partnerships. It is also one of the youngest regions in the world. This issue invites original, high-quality research papers that critically examine the emerging regional, economic and environmental landscape of new Central Asia and its wider Silk Road connections for the coming decades. We welcome interdisciplinary, comparative, and empirical research papers, including from <u>early-career researchers</u> based in Central Asia and neighboring regions.

We invite submissions on (but not limited to) the following topics:

1. Regional cooperation

- Structural transformation of institutions and infrastructure
- Central Asia's role in global institutions and regional value chains
- Regional tourism, special economic zones and logistics hubs
- Critical minerals, resource governance and competition among major powers

• Belt and Road initiatives, the Middle Corridor and other connectivity projects

2. Economic cooperation

- New and evolving trade routes and investment flows
- Transport corridors, digital connectivity and the digital economy
- Food security, rural livelihoods and agricultural transformation
- Labor migration, remittances and household welfare
- Poverty, inequality, entrepreneurship and firm dynamics
- Demographic change, education, health and human capital development

3. Environmental cooperation

- Climate change risks and adaptation in Central Asia
- Green energy transition and low-carbon development pathways
- Cross-border energy and water governance
- Renewable energy, resource efficiency and sustainable development

4. Historical and comparative perspectives

- Central Asia between the historic and contemporary Silk Road
- New development pathways and emerging sources of economic growth
- Comparative analysis with other regions / countries and lessons learned

Submission Timeline

- <u>January 31, 2026</u> Deadline to confirm your interest and submit an **abstract** (up to 250 words) for consideration.
- May 1, 2026 Deadline to submit the **full manuscript** to the journal.

Instructions for Authors

Structure: Your paper should be compiled in the following order: title page; abstract (250 words); keywords; main text introduction, data and methodology, results, discussion; acknowledgments; declaration of interest statement; references; appendices (as appropriate); table(s) with caption(s) (on individual pages); figures; figure captions (as a list).

Word Limit: Please include a word count for your paper. The word limit for the articles is between 5,000 - 8,000 words.

Style Guidelines: The body of the submission should be structured in a logical and easy to follow manner. A clear introduction section should be given that allows non-specialists in the subject an understanding of the publication and a background of the issue(s) involved. Methods, results, discussion and conclusion sections may then follow to clearly detail the information and research presented.

References: This journal uses the Chicago 'author-year' reference system. All citations must be listed at the end of the text file, in alphabetical order of authors' surnames.
