Aims of the programme

In an increasingly sophisticated and ever-changing global business world, it has become essential to build advanced and specialist legal knowledge which can be applied across borders and professional sectors. Our LLM courses in International Commercial and Corporate Law, Corporate Finance and International and Commercial Dispute Resolution aim to empower you with a transformational learning experience and to equip you with the required skills to work in a variety of industries, from commerce to finance and dispute resolution, across the private sector, international organisations and civil society. Your learning will cover a diverse range of subjects from international trade law to aspects of corporate finance, dispute resolution mechanisms and business and human rights, delivered in a dynamic manner that transcends traditional subject areas.

Our LLM courses bring together classroom teaching with work-based learning in a culturally diverse and multi-national environment provided by an array of academics and practitioners. You will gain analytical skills and develop research methodologies on the specialised subjects of your choice, along with practical skills aimed at problem solving and project management.

Equality, diversity and inclusion are the core values of these LLM courses given their trans-national and international nature and their commitment to empower all student voices, including those from BAME backgrounds, the Global South, women and the LGBTQ+ community, thereby encouraging the development of competencies and access to a career of their choice.

- Develop a critical awareness of the potential and limits of law as it relates to the global business world and/or dispute resolution, being mindful of the impact of law in diverse contexts and locations;
- Attain analytical skills, such as problem-solving, to develop creative and innovative solutions that account for inequalities in the design, operation and practice of law;
- Be part of a collaborative, scholarly postgraduate community, building professional networks and positive relationships with others, enabling you to make a meaningful contribution to society, whether in your professional or private life.

Employment and further study opportunities

Graduates from our LLM Courses are employed in an array of specialist legal practice, such as commercial and corporate in-house legal work, investment banking and finance, corporate finance, international and commercial conflict and dispute prevention and resolution law and practice. Subject to any necessary professional requirements, graduates from the LLM Courses have progressed to working as qualified lawyers in private and in-house legal practice; compliance and Environmental, Social and Governance (ESG) officers, practising as barristers; working as company secretaries; sitting as a magistrate and as judges in their own countries; and acting as lawyers for their governments. A number of our graduates continue their academic education by undertaking PhD research degrees at the University of Westminster and beyond.

Course learning outcomes

How will you learn?

Learning methods

Learning on our LLM courses will be inclusive, accessible and challenging.

You will be an active, independent and collaborative learner in an inclusive environment that celebrates diversity, acquiring and developing knowledge in your field of specialism and the requisite skills for the successful completion of your LLM course. You will do this in the following ways:

- Prepare, whether as an individual or in groups, set guided independent tasks and activities that are directed towards acquisition and development of knowledge and/or skills in a graduated manner; ensuring that you have gained and consolidated key knowledge and skills, before proceeding to enhance knowledge and skills;
- Participate, as an individual or within groups, in seminar activities and exercises which are designed to test, consolidate and advance knowledge and skills, along with critical awareness of how law works in practice;
- Reflect on your learning via peer-to-peer and staff feedback within the seminars (and relative to the assessment criteria) though post-seminar tasks and activities, and through formative assessment
- You are expected to bring this working pattern to your dissertation seminars and individual meetings with supervisors, i.e. prepare, participate and reflect.

Your learning is supported through your participation in various co-curricular initiatives and opportunities, such as our Commercial Law Research Group.

Teaching methods

We will impart knowledge and facilitate the acquisition and development of skills by designing and delivering an inclusive and challenging curriculum that celebrates diversity, centred on weekly three-hour interactive seminars. We will:

- Select reading and source material that is current, relevant and reflects diversity of perspectives and representation of knowledge; enables a balanced workload and is readily accessible; and includes a range of cases;
- Design and deliver appropriate seminar activities and exercises that provide the opportunity to test and consolidate knowledge and to apply knowledge in a variety of contexts requiring analysis, evaluation and synthesis and/or problem solving;
- Provide timely and useful feedback on knowledge and skills during seminars and via formative assessments, referencing assessment criteria thereby facilitating awareness of what is required to successfully complete our modules and encouraging self-reflection on learning;
- Invite guest speakers from other academic institutions and/or from the professional world to give lectures within and across individual modules;
- Use digital technology to enhance acquisition of knowledge and development of skills where appropriate to the module learning outcomes.

Assessment methods

To reflect the emphasis of our LLM courses in International Commercial and Corporate Law, Corporate Finance and International and Commercial Dispute Resolution, on the development of advanced and specialist knowledge of law in the relevant fields and the acquisition of transferrable skills, a range of assessment methods are adopted across the modules. These inclusive assessments span the spectrum of research essays, research projects, including legal briefs, policy papers and case studies, showcasing key analytical skills and effective written communication, while those modules assessed by presentation, demonstrate effective oral communication skills.

Many modules across our LLMs are assessed by a combination of assessments, such as research essay and problem based questions or research project and presentation. Details of the assessment(s) for each module is given in the module handbook and module leaders will explain the assessment for their modules, including the criteria upon which your work is assessed, such as:

- Ability to identify and critically analyse the legal issues/concepts
- Use of a range of sources with appropriate methodologies to build critical arguments
- Production of a coherent body of work in good English with proper referencing

In preparation for your assessments, you will draw on the weekly feedback on tasks and activities as well as the feedback on your formative assessment. Formative assessment is an intrinsic part of your preparation for the summative assessment.

Academic Support

Upon arrival, an induction programme will introduce you to the staff responsible for the course, the campus on which you will be studying, the Library and IT facilities, additional support available and to your Campus Registry. You will be provided with the Course Handbook, which provides detailed information about the course. Each course has a course leader or Director of Studies. All students enrolled on a full-time course and part time students registered for more than 60 credits a year have a personal tutor, who provides advice and guidance on academic matters. The University uses a Virtual Learning Environment called Blackboard where students access their course materials, and can communicate and collaborate with staff and other students. The Academic Learning Development Centre supports students in developing the skills required for higher education. As well as online resources in Blackboard, students have the opportunity to attend Study Skills workshops and one to one appointments. Learning support includes four libraries, each holding a collection of resources related to the subjects taught at that site. Students can search the entire library collection online through the Library Search service to find and reserve printed books, and access electronic resources (databases, e-journals, e-books). Students can choose to study in the libraries, which have areas for silent and group study, desktop computers, laptops for loan, photocopying and printing services. They can also choose from several computer rooms at each campus where desktop computers are available with the general and specialist software that supports the courses taught in their College. Students can also securely connect their own laptops and mobile devices to the University wireless network.

How do we ensure the quality of our courses and continuous improvement?

The course was initially approved by a University Validation Panel. University Panels normally include internal peers from the University, academic(s) from another university, a representative from industry and a Student Advisor.

The course is also monitored each year by the College to ensure it is running effectively and that issues which might affect the student experience have been appropriately addressed. Staff will consider evidence about the course, including the evidence of student surveys, student progression and achievement and reports from external examiners, in order to evaluate the effectiveness of the course and make changes where necessary.

A Course revalidation takes place periodically to ensure that the curriculum is up-to-date and that the skills gained on the course continue to be relevant to employers. Students meet with revalidation panels to provide feedback on their experiences. Student feedback from previous years is also part of the evidence used to assess how the course has been running.

How do we act on student feedback?

Student feedback is important to the University and student views are taken seriously. Student feedback is gathered in a variety of ways.

- Through student engagement activities at Course/Module level, students have the opportunity to express their voice in the running of their course. Course representatives are elected to expressly represent the views of their peers. The University and the Students' Union work together to provide a full induction to the role of the course representatives.
- There are also School Representatives appointed jointly by the University and the Students' Union who meet with senior School staff to discuss wider issues affecting student experience across the School. Student representatives are also represented on key College and University committees.;
- All students are invited to complete a questionnaire before the end of each module. The feedback from this will inform the module leader on the effectiveness of the module and highlight areas that could be enhanced.
- Final year Undergraduate students will be asked to complete the National Student Survey which helps to inform the national university league tables.
