Teaching and learning

History at Westminster combines lectures, seminars and workshops with field walks, museum visits and archive tours to bring great variety to your learning experience. There are also opportunities to travel to European cities throughout the course. We offer a choice of stimulating modules in social, political, diplomatic, international and cultural history – many of which are unique to Westminster – and research underpins much of our teaching. We encourage you into a community of scholars through teaching that will enthuse and inspire you. A creative and wide-ranging set of assessments helps you to develop as a historian and you will obtain transferable skills that will last you a lifetime.

Employability

Students of history acquire a range of skills highly sought after by employers, including critical and evaluative thinking, information handling, research, and writing. Graduates of the Westminster History degree have used their knowledge and skills in a wide range of careers including policy-making, curatorship, marketing, teaching, central and local government, working in NGOs, journalism and the law. All of our undergraduates also have the opportunity to undertake a work experience or internship module. Former students have held placements at the Imperial War Museum, the London Metropolitan Archives, the National Archives and the Museum of London, among many other institutions.
